

CREATIVE WRITING Primero students publish first book

Many writers toil for years to hone their skills without ever seeing their work published. Yet for two dedicated Primero students, the goal of seeing their work in print has already become a reality.

Over the summer, 18 year-old Cordero Behrman and his illustrator, Jay Riggins, published a collection of short stories collectively titled "The Gathering." According to Primero's literary magazine advisor Lisa Morelos, this project was a natural extension of some creative writing pieces Behrman had worked on at school. "Cord submitted a few short stories for the literary and art magazine. His passion and talent for writing was evident, but his maturity and style of writing didn't fit with the school literary and art magazine, so I decided to develop a project for him specifically. This way there were no limits to what he could do."

Fellow student Jay Riggins partnered up with Behrman to illustrate the fiction pieces. According to Morelos, "Jay created a cover pic-

the lead on announcements and we've put student leaders on different teams that lead our school. They are taking control and leading things. Student leadership is something our kids are really getting now," said Smithey.

Continuing the theme of leadership and accountability, Smithey outlined how the school is using new "leadership notebooks" that contain mission statements for the school and district. Students will keep their overall and class specific goals in the book and keep track of their overall scores in classes. Students will then use the notebooks to lead parent teacher conferences.

Academically, progress is being made at the school, which is confirmed by improvements in assessment testing. Previewing NWEA (Northwest Evaluation Assosciation) assessments that students will be taking on December 5, Smithey reviewed progress students made on the NWEA test between last spring and this fall.

"With the NWEA scores comparing last spring and last



fall, we had one student in ninth grade improve 20 points. That's an amazing jump. If you look at the number of students we had score in the 80 percentile, you see we had six percent in math, 10 percent for reading, 22 percent for language arts and 19 percent in science," said Smithey. Covering the tenth-grade scores, Smithey pointed to one

Covering the tenth-grade scores, Smithey pointed to one student who had a 35 point improvement in reading, another that saw a 20 point jump and two others that improved by 10 points.

Said Smithey, "We've seen definite growth in our testing and we hope to see this same growth when we check again at mid-year and at end-of-year."

In 2014-15 the school had 55 students enrolled in college courses and 90 percent of those students passed those classes. Last year the school increased those numbers with 77 kids enrolled in college classes and a pass rate of 92 percent.

"This year we added concurrent biology and I've talked to professors that would like to see us also add chemis-



try, U.S. History and business. We've had a lot of talk, so we're hoping for additions there as we move forward," said Smithey.

And for students that get behind in classes, Smithey said the schools intervention program for those students seems to be working with eight students about to graduate from the program back into regular course work.

Updating the high school truancy policy

TSD No. 1 has set the goal this year to improve student attendance at the high school.

Currently, administrators say they have about a 92 percent attendance rate and would like to improve that number to 95 percent this year with a new truancy policy.

TSD No. 1 board members approved the first reading of that truancy policy at their meeting last week.

Board members believe attendance is key to preparing students for college in the work force. "Everyday you're gone you are missing work. The more work you miss the harder it is for you to be successful. If you have a job, you have to show up. That's what the workforce requires and that's what we should require," said board member Deb Hartman.

The new truancy policy lays out that after a student has four absences they will be required to meet with the school councilor. After six absences a student will have to meet with an "attendance board." After eight absences the student will meet with the administrative team, including a school board member. After 11 absences a student will lose class credit. Along every step in the process students will be required to establish a plan to improve their attendance. "Parent buy-in on this is critical," said board member

Parent buy-in on this is critical," said board member Patrick Sandoval.

"It's our goal to prepare students for lifelong learning," said board member Paul Montera. "We think this is a big part of that."

ture for each short story and brought a really neat visual element to the project." Riggins sees himself as a bit of an impressionist artist, a style that melds well with Behrman's fiction: "I like Van Gogh's style. 'A Stary Night' is my favorite painting, and I also like the art style of Akira Toriyama."

Behrman feels that his partnership with Riggins added new depth to his work. "Jay is a great artist, and for the most part his drawings helped me visualize my characters," explains Behrman. "He drew so much more than what is displayed in my writing in 'The Gathering,' and what was shown I think really added to the darker mood of the stories."

Clearly, Behrman is not the typical teen writer. "He is hardworking, motivated, and extremely creative, states Morelos. "What sets him aside from other writers his age is his sensitivity and his unique ability to observe and understand emotions in people that are often hidden or buried. This allows him to depict highly emotional content with realism, and the complexity it warrants. Cord is a highly motivated writer who is easy to work with. I always look forward to reading his new stories, and his casual, laid-back demeanor makes discussing new ideas with him a pleasure. With each new story and project, Cord brings something new to the table; his work continues to grow and mature, and demands to be noticed."

When asked to describe himself as a writer, Behrman's response demonstrates his wit: "As a writer? Wordy. No, obvious puns aside, I think that I am a writer with more ideas in my head than I have words on paper. I aspire to write great things, and I hope that this drive is reflected in my work. I love to write in all genres, but tend to write easiest in fiction, and darker fiction at that, taking a lot of influence from Stephen Kind and J.K. Rowling."

For Behrman, writing is a passion."I love writing. If you've ever had a job that made you feel butterflies in your stomach, or when you stopped working you almost immediately wanted to start up again because it was so fun, then you know how I feel when I write. I don't know why I love it either. I just do. I've loved it since before I could write. I want to change people with my writing. I don't want to just have people buy my book; I want them to be moved by it and the characters within. In five years, I want to get a degree in creative writing (hopefully from Princeton), and in twenty I hope to be a self-sustained author."

Currently, Behrman and Riggins are continuing to develop their creative writing and artistic skills through an independent study program with Ms. Morelos. "This year Cord is willing to venture out of his comfort zone and broaden the way he views his writing," she explains. "He is more inspired by an idea rather than defining himself by a style or genre. Because of this, he is able to take on projects that seem to very different from one another and diversify his body of work. Jay and Cord

are currently working on two comic books (one for elementary-aged kids and one for tweens). They were really interested in working together on a project where they could truly collaborate. Cord is also working on a new series of short stories in his favorite genre, horror fiction."


