expand their own creative film enlightenment. Zach Harmes and students lead this group and are currently in the process of making a short film, title unknown.


Kim Croll enthusiastically teaches this illustrious group of students and looks forward to seeing what they produce.

Have you ever been in a chess game, where the King, the most priceless player, is abruptly dispatched by a pawn, a regular and ineffective participant? Where the King, the one that can kill anyone on the battlefield, suddenly misjudges the move of a pawn, and the pawn gets its chance to deteriorate the mighty tyrant. What makes a pawn and a king so different? A pawn can bring back some of the most valuable players, while the king is just so valuable. A pawn, common and on the verge of defenseless, can save a queen, and all a king can do is move one space. What makes it so that life itself is an offspring of a simple, but complex board of chess?

The passage I have selected today was an old, eminent Italian Proverb. It is short, but has colossal and deep contemplation in it, and is extremely tough to infer, with the incorrect set of mentality. The proverb, though easy to memorize, can control what you think in the future. It equivalently states, "After the game, the King and the Pawn go into the same box." Immediately analogies that are between life, and a game of chess rush threw your mind, leaps off your collarbone, and dives into the ridges of your spinal chord, where it lays its eggs, for you to interpret.

To me this proverb means a large number of things to me. It tells me that no matter if you a king or a street sweeper, when you dance with the grim reaper, he neutralizes everything you have worked for to an equilibrium cause. It makes me reevaluate my dreams, and it makes me look at my future ahead of me. Maybe I do not have to be the best in my class, or maybe I do not have to write the best paper. Does that mean all that I have worked for, pertaining to my future profession; everything that I had sacrificed to be all that I could be, all of it, the tough moments, and even the blissful, all of it was a waste. Maybe, or maybe I'm not even closer.

The person who reads that, and thinks the same way as I had just done, is misinterpreting it. The proverb did not mean to tell you to do

anything in your life, oh no but just the complete opposite. The proverb suggests that the king and the street sweeper are intertwined. In more up-to-date terms that celebrity that you loathe over, because you want her hair, or his skateboard, or their voice, or the groups skills, and you are exactly the same, believe it or not. I'm serious. What makes you think that the pro-star skater all-of-a-sudden became a pro-skater. No, it takes a little perseverance, and a whole lot of perspiration. When you think about it, he had the same dream as you did, not too long ago, of being a pro-star. When you think about life, you both are the same. He's a guy, you're a guy, or she's a girl and you're a girl, and you both are going to the same place. You have to make the determination, if you want to live life to its fullest, and become that one-of-a-kind, unique person, or just slide right by, and not give a second thought about anything or anyone.

The analogy to this proverb and life is very understandable when someone explains it to you. Life, a piece of art, is the old and rigid game that you play. The unthinkable ground you are in is that hard wood you put those pieces on. You are the pieces on the board that try to kill the opposing team, who are all the disappointments and all the unwanted surprises in life. There is just one fateful matter that you have to determine, and that is who you are. Are you the pawn, the ones you would use to start the game, but usually don't last till the end. Or are you going to be a bishop, or a castle, both equally paired, but both equally different. Or are you going to be a knight or a queen, both hard to kill, and very valuable. Or are you going to be a majestic and powerful king, who has lived life to the fullest, and who has separated the ones who are ill-tempered, and the ones who are hateful, from the ones who are happy, the ones who support you, and the ones who would give up their game so that you could still live yours.

The ones that give up their game, and the ones that sacrifice their battlefield, are the true winners. Those are the ones who can virtually survive anything that anyone throws at them. Those are the ones that can entice their hardships, and can subdue it into small pieces. They are the ones that can overcome, even the biggest and greatest, problems and dilemmas, with much ease. The ones that give up all they have diligently worked for, so that someone could enjoy the rest of their lives, are the true kings, in the game of chess.

Raton High School's Future Farmers of America traveled 300 miles last Saturday to Carrizozo, New Mexico, for its first competition of the year. Participating in many contest areas, the students gained valuable experience that will be put to use in their two remaining competitions.

Competing at the Carrizozo Invitational against 32 other high schools from throughout New Mexico, Augusta Ahlm was the top Raton finisher, scoring 5th out of 95 in horse judging. Jeremy Madison and Landon Berry each placed in the top 25% in the wildlife competition.

FFA sponsor Amanda Armacost enjoyed pointing out that FFA members were able to repair the bus's DVD player which, she
