Phil Long Toyota's grand opening in Trinidad draws huge crowd

A who's who of Trinidad community leaders and dignitaries were on hand Thursday night for Phil Long Toyota's grand opening and TLAC Chamber of Commerce ribbon cutting ceremony to celebrate what supporters say will be a much-needed shot in the arm for the regional economy.

Colorado Springs-based Phil Long Family of Dealerships has been totally behind the effort to convert the old Howard Lackey-owned Circle Chevrolet dealership into an expanded and more modernized Toyota sales and service facility.

Jay Cimino has been directly involved in financially supporting numerous Trinidad area projects benefiting the city (including Cimino Park) and Phil Long has had a financial investment in Trinidad State Junior College's student automotive training tech programs.

"This community has always been deep-rooted in great values and as the city of champions," said Cimino. "My father has always been passionate about Trinidad in his business philosophies, the way he feels about the community and the people here."

The dealership's management team is in place, headed by General Manager Jamie Passarelli. Lackey will be a business partner and serve as used car sales manager. Capulin Mothers Day brunch cancelled by new EPA rules

For a quarter-century, Jenny Lee and Jim Pugh have opened the popular summer restaurant at their Capulin Country Store with a Mothers Day brunch buffet. Next Sunday, families from Des Moines, Folsom, Capulin, and the surrounding areas will follow tradition and drive straight from church to the Capulin Country Store, where they'll be excited to treat Mom and Grandma on this annual occasion. Instead, Jenny Lee Pugh will try to explain to them why the buffet has been cancelled and the restaurant closed.

"We were notified last week that we will not be allowed to open this season," Jenny Lee Pugh says, "because of new EPA rules and regulation changes that have been implemented."

The EPA now requires the restaurant to have a modern septic system installed; however, the Capulin Country Store property lacks adequate space to install the required leach field. The property is bounded tightly on two sides by state highways - Highway 64/87 connects Raton and Clayton while Highway 325 takes tourists to the popular Capulin Volcano National Monument just 3 miles

from the store, where many tourists stop for souvenirs, supplies and, in the summer tourist season, lunch.

The Pughs don't mind installing a new septic system. In order to gain the required space, they have asked to buy enough

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County board awaits decision on Medical Marijuana issue

The Las Animas County Board of Commissioners discussed numerous issues at the recent work session.

The top topic was the controversial Medical Marijuana issue.

This issue continues to be time consuming to state, city and especially local county officials. The topic is very contentious among state lawmakers.

A reform bill currently being debated in the legislature, HB 10-1284, is very lengthy and complex in nature. The BOCC has discussed the prospective changes contained in the bill - over 100 amendments to guidelines on the Medical Marijuana law in the state. It seems that everyone at all levels of government have an opinion on this issue on what it means and where it is going.

Relevant to Las Animas County, proposed changes could delay consideration for methodology for approval of any dispensing facilities of Medical Marijuana until July 1, 2011. The board might consider on May 18 an extension to the current county moratorium already in place that runs through May.

H.B. 10-1284 still has to be considered by the state senate, where it will be just as controversial and attention grabbing, as it is statewide.

This might be the last bill the senate acts on before, by law, they have to adjourn on May 12.

Another very interesting subject that the county commissioners have been discussing and will probably need to make a decision upon this week is the program called "ReCharge Colorado."

Originating from the Governor's Energy Office, this program has set aside about \$18 million in rebates statewide. Las Animas County is expecting about \$75,000 in rebates back from this program, for persons that buy Energy Star appliances like refrigerators, washers, dryers, and dish washers. The Energy Star rating is based upon whether or not these products meeting criteria for being energy efficient and being environmentally safe.

The program started on April 19. The governor's office has asked Mr. Bill Cordova and the Las Animas County Board of
